Value Your Freedom

Galatians 4.8-20 ~ June 26, 2011

> 4-part Structure

- Verses 8 11 ~ Galatians (were <u>lost</u>, then <u>saved</u>, now <u>confused</u>)
- Verses 12 16 ~ Paul (was honored by them, now rejected)
- **Read v17** ~ Judaizers (<u>court them</u> to reject them ~ why seek to please)
- **Verses 18 -20** ~ Galatians (*Paul expresses* <u>love and concern</u> for them)

PART 1 ~ Galatians are Lost, Saved then Confused

- v8 ~ "you served those which by nature are not gods"
- Acts 13 to 14 tells of first visit to Galatia
 - They visited Cyprus, Perga, Antioch in Pisidia, Iconium, Lystra and Derbe
- Healing of crippled man in Lystra (Acts 14.8-18)
 - □ In Lycaonian the people said <u>Zeus</u> and <u>Hermes</u> had come down to them
 - They brought oxen & garlands intending to sacrifice to them
 - Shortly afterwards they stoned Paul and left him for dead

> v9 ~ "you have known God, or rather, are known by God"

- Our joy should <u>not</u> arise from within us . . . (<u>mood</u>, <u>circumstances</u>, <u>wealth</u>)
 - □ ☑ Stormy Waves ~ Our joy is anchored far beneath them
 - We are joyful because God knows and loves us ~ not we Him
- In Luke 10.17 the disciples said, "Even the demons are subject to us"
 - Jesus replied, "... do not rejoice in this, that the spirits are subject to you, but rather rejoice because your names are written in heaven."
 - Our joy is founded upon a fact an objective truth our salvation
- "If your joy can be lost because of your mood or your circumstances then your anchor is not holding fast ~ you're adrift from God . . ."

➤ How can you desire bondage?

- **Read verse 9** ~ simplification is . . .
- "Having tasted God's freedom, how can you desire bondage?"
 - Especially bondage to "weak and beggarly elements" see v3b
- **v10** ~ Bondage defined
 - "You observe days and months and seasons and years."

Xition: We must clarify what Paul is saying . . .

"What does Paul mean in verse 10?"

- v10 ~ "You observe days and months and seasons and years."
- "To whom is Paul writing?"
 - 1. former **Jews** ~ who are used to keeping ceremonial laws
 - 2. former pagans ~ who are used to superstitious practices
 - Such different peoples but whose fears are similar
 - Each approached their religions in superstitious ways
 - Each allowed outward ceremonies and rituals to prevail over God
- Paul addresses a common failure of all religion ~ works righteousness
 - Superstitious observance of rituals
 - Quid pro quo behaviors ~ People earning God's favor . . .
- Paul warns the Galatians about this type of thinking
- Christian life is not about superstitions

> PART 2 ~ Paul Reminds them How they Treated Him

- <u>Become like me</u> because <u>I became like you</u>
 - Paul once lived a life of bondage as they're now courting . . .
 - Paul had been <u>superstitious</u> in his service towards God
 - He described himself as "more zeglous" than all his brethren.
 - At that time he didn't realize the weight of those bonds . . .
 - Until Jesus relieved him of them on the Road to Damascus . . .
 - "Take my yoke upon you. My yoke is easy and my burden is light."
 - Martin Luther
 - The harder he worked the more miserable he became . . .
 - There was no happiness or joy or true peace down that road
 - <u>III</u>: <u>Matrix</u> ~ <u>Trinity</u> says "you've been down that road Neo . . ."
- Let's back up to the end of verse 11 for a minute
 - "I'm afraid for you, lest I have labored for you in vain..."
 - Paul knows that <u>true faith frees people</u> from bondage
 - These people are not acting free . . .

Paul's Condition

- v13 ~ "because of physical infirmity I preached the gospel to you"
- Paul's condition afforded him the opportunity to preach to the Galatians
- It was something offensive or embarrassing ~ but they accepted him
 - "though my condition was a trial to you, you did not scorn or despise me" ~ESV

Xition: They had loved and accepted Paul . . .

They had loved and accepted Paul . . . But why? (v15)

- Paul says, "you would have plucked out your eyes and given them to me"
- Before that he'd asked, "What then was the blessing you enjoyed?" (v15a)
 - I.e., They would have given him their eyes only for good reason
 - They'd loved Paul because they'd loved his message . . .
- So Paul reasonably asks, "Why the sudden change?"
 - And he proposes an answer . . .
 - v16 ~ "Have I become your enemy because I tell you the truth?"

> PART 3 ~ The Judaizers do not treat the Galatians well (v17)

- "they zealously court you" ~ "but for no good"
- "they want to exclude you"
 - The Judaizers seek them out to tell them they don't belong
 - They seek them out to shun them
- Why do they shun the Galatians? ~ "that you may be zealous for them"
- This seems like reverse psychology or marketing
 - People want to go to the <u>club</u> that it's hardest to get into
 - Then if you're <u>allowed in</u> you must be something special

> But Paul allowed them in very easily . . . maybe too easily . . .

- People expect to work for something valuable
 - Not just have it given to them . . .
 - "Perhaps what they'd been given wasn't all that valuable . . . ?"

> PART 4 ~ Paul Expresses Love and Doubt

- He wants to stir them up, remind them of what they'd had with him
 - But he cannot be there with them ~ Read verse 18
 - They must learn to <u>live by faith</u>
 - And so must we . . .
- If every time we opened the Bible . . .
 - a burst of light sprang forth
 - angelic voices serenaded us
 - God's love filled our heart
 - Then we'd always have it open . . . We'd never let it go closed . .
 - We'd have Bibles sitting open in every room of our house . . .
 - Spiritual Potpourri

> Xition: But it doesn't work that way does it . . . ?

> Our love grows cold without our efforts

- In **2 Tim 1.6** Paul told Timothy "<u>stir up</u> the gift of God which is in you"
- **Hebrews 10.24-25** says, "... let us consider one another in order to <u>stir up</u> love and good works, not forsaking the assembling of ourselves together, as is the manner of some, but exhorting one another."
- Love cannot survive without this stirring up . . .
 - Between husband and wife ~ parents and children ~ families
 - This is true of our <u>loving one another</u> or our <u>loving God</u>
 - We must work at it . . . It doesn't just happen . . .
 - We must persist in <u>reading our Bibles</u> through dry spells . . .
 - We must persist in <u>praying our prayers</u> through dry spells . . .
 - We must persist in good works despite our hearts going cold . . .
- **2 Peter 1.10-14** ~ "Therefore, brethren, be even more diligent to make your call and election sure, for if you do these things you will never stumble; for so an entrance will be supplied to you abundantly into the everlasting kingdom of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ... I think it is right, as long as I am in this tent, to <u>stir you up</u> by reminding you, knowing that shortly I must put off my tent, just as our Lord Jesus Christ showed me."

> Sermon Title: "Value Your Freedom"

- Paul is accusing the Galatians of abandoning their spiritual freedom
 - He tells them they are submitting themselves to bondage ~ willingly
 - They're walking into the prison and saying, "Put 'em on! Lock me up!"
 - "Why would anybody do this . . . ?" ~ FEAR . . .
 - They were comfortable with the shackles of works righteousness
 - GRACE (in contrast) makes them uncomfortable
- We Americans are throwing off freedoms for which our forefathers died
 - □ "Why do we do this . . . ?" ~ FEAR . . .
 - We're afraid of having to care for grandma and grandpa . . .
 - Let the **STATE** do it . . . They have far more resources than us . . .
 - We're afraid of many things . . .
 - Instead of retaining our freedoms and praying for
 - ♦ strength and courage to face our challenges . . .
 - We instead offer ourselves to the STATE and abandon our God . . .
- As Paul said, "I have doubts about you . . ."
