The Character of Job

- Job was a contemporary of Abraham (from same area)
 - \diamond <u>Terah</u> lived to 205 / <u>Abraham</u> lived to 175 / <u>Job</u> lived to at least 185
- He was a very <u>wealthy</u> and <u>successful</u> man (Job 1.3)
- He was <u>blameless and upright</u> / feared God and shunned evil (Job 1.8; 2.3)
 - ♦ He was <u>unique</u> in this ~ "best of the best" (Job 1.8 "none like him")
- Job was God's champion of sorts (Job 1.8; 2.3 "Have you considered")
 - ♦ He resisted temptation better than Adam (Job 2.9–10 wife)
 - ♦ He endured suffering like Jesus (Job 1.21; 2.10)

The Court of Heaven

- In Job 1 and 2 occurs an event <u>unique</u> in Scripture
 - $\diamond~$ We witness two discourses between God and Satan
- We can't go into detail but let's note 4 things:
 - 1. <u>God brings up Job</u> both times (Job 1.8; 2.3)
 - Solution Sol
 - ♦ Note that <u>God's words do not change</u> ~ they are identical
 - But Satan's <u>must</u> change ~ his first prophecy failed (**Job 1.11; 2.5**)
 - 2. God rules over Satan and controls his bounds (Job 1.12; 2.6)
 - 3. Satan challenges God to attack Job ~ but God allows Satan to do so
 - ♦ <u>III</u>: Boettner's "Reformed Doctrine of Predestination"
 - "Satan is a tool in the hand of God"
 - 4. God and Satan have <u>different objectives</u> in Job's life

Calamity Strikes

✤ Read Job 1.13–19

- \diamond Sabeans take oxen and donkeys ~ Fire destroys sheep and servants
- \diamond Chaldeans take camels ~ Great wind kills his sons and daughters
- "While he was still speaking" vss 16, 17 and 18
 - ♦ Satan used shock and awe in his attack ~ tried to overwhelm his integrity
 - ♦ Satan wanted Job to know this attack was <u>sanctioned by God</u>

Xition: How did Job respond?

Job Responded . . . Very Well

* Read Job 1.20-22

- ♦ Job immediately <u>recognized</u> and <u>accepted</u> this was <u>of God</u>
- \diamond And he responded as few people do . . .
- ✤ Job 1.22 ~ "Job did not sin nor charge God with wrong"
- Job 2.10b ~ "Job did not sin with his lips" / But did Job sin in his heart?
- ✤ <u>III</u>: Tom's pastor when barn wall broke legs / "Lord Jesus, give me strength"

Job's Three Friends Mean Well

- ✤ Read Job 2.11–13
- We note 6 things here:
 - 1. They inconvenienced themselves ~ "each came from his own place"
 - 2. They talked to one another ~ "made an appointment together"
 - "It is good manners to be an unbidden guest at the house of mourning"
 - 3. They purposed to "mourn with him, and to comfort him"
 - 4. They "did not recognize him" ~ ashes, boils and anguish distort features
 - 5. They joined him in his grief
 - "wept", "tore robes", "put dust on heads" and "sat in ashes"
 - 6. They sat with him for "seven days and seven nights"
- These three men are very good friends . . .
 - ♦ But they are <u>unprepared to deal</u> with Job's <u>grief and despair</u>

Job Cries Out in Despair

- He curses his day of birth
 - Read Job 3.1 ~ "Job . . cursed the day of his birth"
- He wishes he'd died at birth
 - Read Job 3.11 ~ "Why did I not die at birth?"
- He longs for death
 - Read Job 3.20–21 ~ "Why is light given to him who . . long[s] for death?"
- Job had now given himself over to depression and despair
- ✤ Had God abandoned him? / The text doesn't say . . . but I think so . . .
 - ♦ Jesus was tested in the wilderness ~ but afterwards comforted
 - ♦ Jesus was abandoned while on the cross ~ but afterwards elevated to glory
 - \diamond God tested <u>Job</u> . . . God tested <u>Jesus</u> . . . God tests <u>us</u> . . .

Xition: How did Job's 3 Friends Respond?

Job's Friends Responded . . . <u>Poorly</u>

- ✤ All three of Job's friends are probably older than him ~ Eliphaz the eldest
- Eliphaz immediately criticizes Job
 - ♦ Job 4.2 ~ He assumes Job will not welcome his words
 - ✤ Job 4.5 ~ He minimizes Job's grief without addressing it
 - ♦ Job 4.6 ~ He accuses him of misplacing his faith and confidence
 - ♦ Job 4.7–9 ~ He implies Job's children deserved what happened
- This is an <u>awful attempt to comfort</u> a grieving friend

Job Responds in Moderation

- Job 6.2–4 ~ He admits "my words have been rash"
- ✤ Job 6.8–9 ~ He repeats his desire to die
- Job 6.14 ~ He instructs his friends / "kindness should be shown"
- Job 6.24 25a ~ Job tells them to use facts in their rebukes
- Job 6.27 ~ He accuses them of misconduct
- ✤ Job 7.7b ~ He is seriously depressed and assumes he's going to die
- Job 7.11 ~ This is why he feels justified in speaking candidly

Bildad Rubs Salt in Job's Wounds

- ✤ Job 8.3–4 ~ Bildad refers to the death of Job's children as an act of justice
- ✤ Job 8.5–6 ~ If you would only repent and turn to God He would comfort you

Job's Bitterness Leads to Sin

- ✤ Job 9.1–13 ~ He tells of God's might
- ✤ Job 9.14–20 ~ And <u>his own smallness</u> by comparison
 - → Job 9.22-23 ~ <u>He accuses God</u> ~ "It is all one thing" & "He destroys the blameless and the wicked" & "He laughs at the plight of the innocent"

Chapters 11 through 15

- Zophar attacks him mildly in ch 11
- Job eloquently describes God's power in ch 12 through ch 14
 - Theme verse given in Job 13.15 ~ "Though he slay me, yet will I trust in Him. Even so I will defend my own ways before Him."
- Read Job 15.1–13 ~ Eliphaz responds with a bitter attack against Job

Xition: Let's reread our text – Job 16.1–6 ...

We Can Help

- I included verse 6 for a reason . . . Read v6
 - ♦ Neither <u>silence</u> nor <u>speaking</u> aids the sufferer
 - ♦ We friends of the grieving have a purpose to fulfill . . .
 - ♦ <u>Time alone</u> is not the ultimate healer ~ But the love of friends and family
 - We are like an <u>ointment</u> allowing <u>fast and complete healing</u>

Always Remember 2 things !

- Remember what has happened
 - ♦ These men <u>responded poorly</u> to Job's attitude and despair
 - ♦ "What did they expect ~ to discuss business as on earlier visits?"
- Remember why you're there
 - ♦ These men went to mourn with Job and comfort him
 - ♦ Their initial actions and 7 days of <u>silence</u> was a great start
 - Sut they did not know what to say . . . so they argued with him . . .

What Not to Say or Do

- Don't speak in platitudes ~ Probably our biggest weakness
 - ♦ "God means this for your good . . ."
 - ♦ "God will not test you beyond what you're able . . ."
 - ♦ "All things work together for the good to those that love God . . . "
 - Not helpful ~ they already know and believe these things or they don't
 They don't need to hear theological concepts no matter how true
- Don't ignore the people or the topic
 - \diamond This is sadly what many people do . . .

What to Say ... 4 Things ...

- 1. Address the issue directly ~ "I heard that ______ died?"
 - \diamond This will show them that they can discuss it with you if they want
- 2. Express sympathy ~ "I'm so sorry to hear this . . ."
 - ♦ What's happened is <u>not just a fact</u> . . . It's potentially a crisis . . .
- 3. If you are at a loss for words, say that . . .
 - "I'm not sure what to say, but I want you to know I care."
- 4. Ask them "Do you feel like talking about it?"

Xition: Let's reread our text – Job 16.1–6 ...

What to Do . . .

- <u>Respond</u> to a <u>personal attack</u> with <u>love</u>, <u>grace</u> and <u>patience</u>
 - ♦ Even in good times we're to endure unfair attacks ~ how much more so now?
 - ♦ <u>III</u>: Aunt's health and cousin's <u>facebook post</u>
- Comfort and console them
 - \diamond They need to be <u>hugged</u> / to be <u>cried</u> with / to <u>reminisce</u>
 - ♦ They need to be protected from the witless and the clueless
 - ♦ <u>III</u>: Zia's operation ~ as Dad I should have comforted him
- Take the initiative in offering practical assistance
 - \diamond Don't try and run their life but . . .
 - ♦ Run errands for them ~ Clean up ~ Do the dishes
 - ♦ Help with funeral arrangements
 - ♦ Assist with visitors or callers
 - Watch their children or pets
 - \diamond Don't expect to be called ~ If you're a friend just go . . .

May God make us all compassionate comforters of the grieving . . .

Glory to God

- Now to Him who is able to keep you from stumbling,
 And to present you faultless
 Before the presence of His glory with exceeding joy,
