Suffering by Design

July 12, 2015 ~ 1 Peter 4.12-19

(Read v12) ~ Fiery Trial not Strange

- ❖ <u>Peter</u> is writing to Christians all across modern day <u>Turkey</u> ~ mid-60's of 1st century
 - ♦ 1.1 "pilgrims of the Dispersion in Pontus, Galatia, Cappadocia, Asia and Bithynia"
 - → <u>Trials had</u> already <u>begun</u> / **1.6** ".. you <u>have been</u> grieved by various trials"
 - ♦ An intense persecution has begun / Many are in distress because of it
 - ♦ Some may be <u>surprised</u> by the <u>ferocity</u> of it and are unprepared for it
 - ♦ Peter warns it will continue it will get worse / 4.12 "trial which is to try you"
 - ♦ He is not denying or minimizing their present situation or their future reality
- Christians today in China, Syria, Iraq, Iraq, Saudi Arabia, Egypt, Sudan, etc... would not be surprised by receipt of this letter / These people face harsh persecution
 - ♦ But we Christians of America have had it so easy for such a very long time
 - ♦ We are unaccustomed to persecution and we are unprepared for it
 - ♦ We must prepare ourselves and our children for what may come
 - We can and should <u>pray</u> that it <u>not come</u>
 - But just as with the many peoples to whom Peter is writing . . .
 - We must not deny that it is already here / and it will likely worsen

(Read v13) ~ Rejoice that you Partake in Christ's Sufferings

- Can Peter be serious, that you are to ".. rejoice .. that you partake of.. sufferings?"
 - ♦ "Is this hyperbole, exaggeration, masochism, insanity?" / No . . .
 - ♦ There's a truth here that we can't fully comprehend
- ❖ Peter had rejoiced himself in response to suffering, many years earlier . . .
 - ♦ Acts 4.18 ~ Peter & John commanded "not to speak or teach in the name of Jesus."
 - ♦ v19-20 They replied that they would be obedient to God
 - ♦ **v29-30** Then they <u>prayed for boldness</u> to speak in the name of Jesus
 - ♦ Acts 5.18 ~ The apostles are again <u>imprisoned</u>
 - ♦ v20 But an <u>angel</u> releases them & commands them to preach in the Temple
 - ♦ Acts 5.26 ~ They are again brought before the <u>Sanhedrin</u>
 - ♦ v29 They reply "We ought to obey God rather than men."
 - v34-39 The council <u>wants to kill</u> them / But <u>Gamaliel</u> rescues them
 - ♦ **v40** They are beaten and commanded to not speak in Jesus' name
 - ♦ Acts 5.41 ~ "rejoicing that they were counted worthy to suffer shame for His name"

Xition: Peter knew that of which he spoke . . .

Peter Knew Suffering / But We Do Not

- This is something we need to study to understand . . .
- * "Why did the Apostles rejoice that day they were beaten?"
 - ♦ Because ".. they were counted worthy to suffer shame for His name"
 - ♦ "Are you worthy to suffer shame for Jesus?"
 - ♦ "Do we even want to be worthy to suffer shame for His name?"
 - ♦ Especially if it means we'll be arrested, threatened, imprisoned and beaten
 - ♦ "What does it mean to be worthy to suffer shame?"

Worthy Suffering

- ❖ Jesus never sinned ~ He died a <u>sinless</u> man ~ <u>the</u> sinless man
- ❖ In a sense, His death was the <u>only truly unrighteous death</u> on this earth
 - ♦ Since the sin of Adam and Eve all others have had a <u>death sentence</u> resting upon them
 - ♦ A <u>temporal earthly</u> death sentence / And an <u>eternal spiritual</u> death sentence
- So all but Jesus bears some real responsibility for the sin of this earth
 - ♦ But, when people embrace the forgiveness of sin available through Christ
 - ♦ When they <u>turn from</u> their former <u>sin</u>ful ways and fully embrace God
 - → They embrace true righteousness, they identify with Christ and His sufferings.
- When such people are reviled or persecuted, when they suffer yet endure . . .
 - ♦ Then they reflect the glory of God
- Christ's obedience unto death earned our salvation
 - ♦ But our "worthy suffering" purifies us of sin and glorifies God

(Read v13-14) ~ Two Outcomes of Worthy Suffering in vss 13-14

- 1. v13 ~ "that when His glory is revealed, you may also be glad with exceeding joy"
- 2. v14 ~ "blessed are you, for the Spirit of glory and of God rests upon you"
 - ♦ These two blessings indicate that we are God's special treasure
 - ♦ Enduring the abuse of an enemy of God well, pleases and glorifies God (v14).

(Read v15) ~ Our Suffering Must Not be Due to Our Own Sin

- ❖ I am concerned for myself and all Christians in our society
- We live in an age of relative peace and ease
 - ♦ We do not endure <u>abuse</u>, <u>reproach</u>, <u>suffering</u> or even <u>criticism</u> well
 - ♦ Yes, we should defend our Constitutional rights . . . But hear in **1798** what . . .
 - ♦ John Adams said, "Our constitution was made only for a moral and religious people. It is wholly inadequate to the government of any other."

Xition: The Constitution will <u>not</u> protect us from the abuse that is coming . . .

Suffering Must be for Just Behavior

- We live in a time of immature Christians
 - → Perhaps many aren't even Christians / But perhaps some are . . .
 - "Will they remain faithful through reproach, abuse and persecution?"
- Well, that's in part at least the point of persecution . . .
 - ♦ God purifies His <u>children</u> / He purifies His <u>church</u>
 - ♦ Peter used the term "fiery trials" (i.e., "trial by fire")
 - ♦ The fire renders some precious metal useless too many impurities
 - ♦ But for the rest it removes the impurities / the heat drives the impurities out

(Read v16) ~ Embrace the name Christian with Pride

- Modern western society spits upon Christianity
 - ♦ When Michael Chang (age 17) won the French Open in 1989 he gave the glory to Jesus
 - ♦ He said, "I thank the Lord Jesus Christ, because without Him, I am nothing."
 - Some in the audience loudly booed him
 - ♦ The French Open was occurring during the Tiananmen Square crackdown
 - ♦ He later said, "The crackdown that happened was on the middle Sunday at the French Open, so if I was not practicing or playing a match, I was glued to the television, watching the events unfold... I often tell people I think it was God's purpose for me to be able to win the French Open the way it was won because I was able to put a smile on Chinese people's faces around the world at a time when there wasn't much to smile about."
- It has become <u>politically correct</u> to <u>mock</u> or <u>insult</u> Christians and <u>Christianity</u>
 - ♦ But for this very reason we ought to set ourselves up as targets for the mockers
 - ♦ Let the mockers mock . . . Let the haters hate . . . What we are called to do is endure
 - ♦ Their insults, their taunts, their cruelty, will be heard again in courts of heaven
 - ♦ And our <u>patient endurance</u>, our <u>calm demeanor</u> will also be seen

Martyrdom of Polycarp

- ❖ Polycarp was an elder of Smyrna / He was 86 years old by this time
 - ♦ The letter from the church of Smyrna records his <u>martyrdom</u>
- ❖ Many in the church tried to convince him to flee to <u>escape</u> but he chose to <u>stay</u>
- ❖ In the arena even the government official (proconsul) wanted to spare his life
 - ♦ He urged him to just take a small pinch of incense and offer it in homage to Caesar
 - ♦ But he would not do it . . .
 - ♦ He urged him to cry out "Away with the atheists" for that's what they called Christians
 - ♦ He cast a feeble arm towards the jeering crowd and said, "Away with the atheists"
 - → He urged him to take the <u>oath</u> to <u>curse Christ</u> to which Polycarp replied

* "Eighty-six years I have served Him, and He never did me any wrong. How can I blaspheme my King who saved me?' Tied to the stake, Polycarp prayed to be received by the Lord 'as a rich and acceptable sacrifice."

Cuban Christian Martyrs

- Christians were arrested and imprisoned in Cuba under brutal conditions
 - ♦ Armando Valladares documented this in his book, "Against All Hope" (2001)
 - ♦ They were <u>ordered to deny Christ</u> and <u>embrace Communism</u> as a condition of release
 - ♦ Some that continually refused to do so were executed
 - When brought outside for execution they would cry out
 - "Long live Christ the King! Down with Communism!"
 - This cry became so disturbing to the jailers that they would first gag the men

(Read v17) ~ Judgment Begins at the House of God

- The argument Peter states is one from <u>lesser to greater</u>
 - ◆ "God loves His children, yet allows them to be mistreated in this way"
 - "Imagine then how severe the judgment of God will be upon the mockers"
 - ♦ The same fire that purifies the child of God ~ destroys the mocker of God

■ Suffering for Christ is a pledge to us of the reality that we truly belong to Christ
☐ If we truly are partaking of Christ's suffering – it's because Christ is in us
☐ It is the Christ in us – too visible to others – that makes them hate us so
☐ Jesus said, "Let your light so shine before men, that they may see your good works and
glorify your Father in heaven"
