Philippians 4.2-9 ~ July 25, 2010

Background on Philippians

- Paul first visited Philippi on his 2nd missionary journey
- The visit is recorded in Acts 16.9-40
 - Paul has a vision of a man from Macedonia saying
 - "Come over to Macedonia and help us"
 - Philippi is the <u>major city</u> of the area
 - On the Sabbath they went to the <u>riverside</u> where <u>women met</u> to pray
 - Lydia (from Thyatira) is converted and they stay with her at her house
 - Paul exorcises a demon from a <u>slave girl fortune teller</u>
 - Paul and Silas were arrested and beaten with rods
 - At midnight while they were praying/singing <u>earthquake</u> strikes
 - They save the <u>Philippian jailor</u> from committing suicide
 - Magistrates plead with them to leave next morning <u>Roman citizens</u>

v2 ~ "implore Euodia" and "implore Syntyche"

- There is not much here ~ only 16 words ~ but we clearly infer 3 facts
 - 1. The dispute between the women is very public
 - It may have begun as a <u>small matter</u> between the two of them
 - But by <u>now everybody knows</u> ~ everybody tempted to take sides
 - I think it's personal ~ no factions are referenced . . .

2. Paul, from his vantage, does not see a clear culprit and victim

- He <u>implores each woman</u> individually to pursue peace
- He had <u>already hinted</u> at this very same thought
 - ◆ 1.27 ~ "let your conduct be worthy of the gospel of Christ, so that whether I come and see you or am absent, I may hear of your affairs, that you stand fast in one spirit, with one mind striving together for the faith of the gospel"
 - ◆ 2.2 ~ "fulfill my joy by being like-minded, having the same love, being of one accord, of one mind"
 - ♦ 3.15-16 ~ "let us, as many as are mature, have this mind ... let us walk by the same rule, let us be of the same mind"
- 3. Paul believes the situation must be resolved ~ it cannot be ignored

Xition: We'll get to the details of it now in verse 3 . . .

> v3b ~ "these women labored with me in the gospel"

- We learn 3 more facts about these women
 - 1. They were once "of the <u>same mind</u> in the Lord"
 - The text doesn't say they were friends
 - But it does say they each "<u>labored with Paul</u> in the gospel"
 - 2. They once behaved more Christianly than they do now
 - Women didn't preach or evangelize as Paul did (1 Tim 2.12)
 - But they prayed, taught, trained, served and supported Paul's work
 - 3. Despite their present dispute Paul regards them each as true believers
 - Their "names are in the Book of Life"

v3a ~ "I urge you also, true companion, help these women"

- They all (Paul, these women, true companion, Clement, fellow workers) labored in the gospel in apparent unity
 - Paul insists they strive to <u>restore the unity</u> they once enjoyed
 - Why?
 - Why is trying to restore unity so important?
 - After all, what if this attempted reconciliation backfires?
 - Isn't it better to let sleeping dogs lie?
 - □ No...
 - That's what we want to do...
 - That's what <u>Satan wants</u> us to do...
 - But we must do what God commands us to do...
 - If we don't we're behaving no better than an unbeliever...
 - ♦ God insists that we seek reconciliation
 - If you do not obey Him in this, do you really expect Him to bless you?
 - This is what how God would have us <u>treat those</u> that refuse to obey:
 - 2 The 3.14-15 ~ "if anyone does not obey our word in this epistle, note that person and <u>do not keep company with him</u>, that he may be ashamed. Yet do not count him as an enemy, but admonish him as a brother"
 - We are to <u>shun</u> fellow Christians who stubbornly oppose God

> v4-7 ~ Review of "Worry Warriors" message two weeks ago

- Today's message is wrapped around the <u>previous message</u>
- The last message <u>can</u> stand alone ~ but it was given in a context
- I've now presented that context ~ And will go on to verses 8 and 9

Xition: We'll now briefly review verses 4 thru 7

> v4 ~ Rejoice

- Paul and the Philippians were enduring persecution
- Yet Paul urged them to rejoice... How much more so should we?
- Paul <u>pounded</u> joy into them in this letter as he does to us . . .

> v5 ~ Conduct yourself as a Christian

- Prefer being wronged over wronging others
- Allow yourself to be <u>vulnerable</u> / trust God to protect you
- Be gentle and not quarrelsome with people

> v6 ~ Be anxious for nothing . . .

- Worry will come . . .
- But God has given us an antidote for worry
- III: Deadly snake bite of worry remedied by antidote of thankful prayer

> v7 ~ The supernatural <u>peace of God</u> fills us when we pray

- We seek joy and peace through many other means
- But only thankful prayer in the Lord brings true peace
- This peace guards our hearts and minds from evil

➤ Recite verses 4 to 7 collectively twice through

- "Rejoice in the Lord always ... hearts and minds through Christ Jesus"
- We memorize because the text serves as fuel for meditation later
- And meditation leads to 1) understanding and 2) integration into our lives

v8 ~ "Finally brethren . . ."

- Paul began to end this letter at **3.1** with the <u>same phrase</u>
- But he got a <u>second wind</u> (or more precisely was <u>filled</u> with a 2nd wind)
- But now he really does begin to wrap up the letter
- He begins the end with this admonition to meditate . . .
- I need to address a thought that comes up here . . .
 - "Is Paul just telling us to ignore the <u>harsh realities</u> of life here?"
 - □ "Is he just being a <u>Pollyanna?</u>"

Xition: What does it mean to be a Pollyanna?

> Pollyanna verses Cassandra

- Pollyanna was the heroine in a <u>1913 novel</u> of the same name
 - She was an <u>irrepressible optimist</u> ~ seeing good in everything
 - "Looking at the world through rose-colored glasses"
- Cassandra "A prophetess of Greek mythology"
 - Her Trojan War predictions, though true, were not believed
 - Someone who speaks a negative truth and <u>isn't believed</u>
- A Pollyanna is an incredibly <u>hopeful person</u> ~ <u>an incurable optimist</u>
- A Cassandra is a hopelessly <u>honest person</u> ~ <u>a doom and gloomer</u>
- One web site described them like this:
 - Cassandras are disparaged as "nattering nabobs of negativism" (W.S.)
 - Pollyannas are dismissed as "pandering puppies of positivism" (M.B.)
- "Is Paul being a Pollyanna here?"
 - No ~ To think that you probably misunderstand the text
 - Paul's admonition concerns <u>meditation</u> ~ <u>not observation</u>
 - He's not commanding us to ignore sin in our world . . .
 - He is commanding us to not let it rule us inside and defeat us . . .
 - It's a thin line that separates us from the evil that we oppose . . .

➤ The sermon title is "Mind Control"

- When we hear the term we probably think of <u>controlling others minds</u>
- But we <u>cannot control our own</u> minds let alone the minds of others
- Yet Scripture commands us to exercise control of our minds . . .

> v8a ~ "whatsoever things are . . . "

- true ~ "facts not conjecture / not lies"
- noble ~ "<u>dignified</u> not dishonorable"
- just ~ "fair not biased"
- pure ~ "wholesome not polluted"
- lovely ~ "beautiful not ugly or base"
- good report ~ "successes seek out the good"

> v8b~ "if there is . . . "

- any <u>virtue</u> ~ "good in and of itself" ~ <u>INWARD</u>
- anything <u>praiseworthy</u> ~ "good as it impacts others" ~ <u>OUTWARD</u>

Xition: What are we to do with this list . . . ?

v8c ~ "meditate on these things"

- Allow these to <u>fill your mind</u> and nothing else
 - When something is <u>full</u> nothing else gets in
- Our minds are always active
- "Idle hands are the devil's workshop" (12th century)
- "Idle brains are the devil's workhouses" (1732 book)
 - <u>David</u> stayed behind (<u>idle body and idle mind</u>)
 - He sought distractions and fell into adultery with Bathsheba
- We are to fill our minds with good . . .
- We are to think God's thoughts after Him . . .
- We do this by:
 - filling our minds with productive, constructive, God-honoring thoughts
 - filling our hours with productive, constructive, God-honoring activities
- You can't sit around all day with an empty head
 - You were made for much more . . .

v9 ~ "learned – received – heard - saw"

- Mimicry is the highest form of flattery
- Paul commands us often in Scripture to follow his example
- III: Teacher in Irvine "Don't watch ... listen" "Don't listen ... watch"
- With Paul, we can safely do both
 - His actions never differed from his commands

> Let us tie this all together

- Paul begins the 4th chapter with this <u>dispute</u> between <u>two women</u>
 - He instructs his <u>true companion</u> to help them settle the dispute
 - He then commands them to <u>rejoice</u> whatever their circumstances
 - He commands them to <u>pray</u> to address their worries
 - He then instructs them to <u>meditate</u> on godliness
 - And to <u>mimic</u> him in living godly lives
- Note the route these 8 verses (2 to 9) took
 - From corrective actions to preventive thoughts and actions
 - From addressing the <u>entire body</u> to individuals
 - From <u>practical body life</u> to <u>practical individual holiness</u>
