#### Communion Meditation – Jonah

Jonah 4.1-3 (read 3.10 – 4.3) "Jonah Gets Angry" Sep 29<sup>th</sup>, 2013

#### Recap

- Jonah disobeyed God and ran away towards Tarshish
  - Until today's text we'd not known why Jonah had run away
  - Could have been <u>fear of Assyrians</u> ~ But it was <u>hatred</u>
  - Pastor Kayser spoke of this in sermon last week ~ "bitterness"
- Jonah is given a  $2^{nd}$  chance ~ and he obeys
  - $\circ$   $\;$  The entire city turns to God in repentance including king

## v1 ~ "It Displeased Jonah Exceedingly"

- An entire <u>city turns to God</u> and <u>Jonah</u> is <u>exceedingly displeased</u>
  - $\circ~$  Then we learn details of when he ran away from God at the start
  - v2 ~ ".. was this not what I said .. therefore I fled to Tarshish"
  - o "gracious and merciful .. slow to anger .. abundant in lovingkindness"
- ".. please take my life from me .. better for me to die"
  - Jonah would rather die than live in such a world <u>III</u>: <u>Les Mis</u> (Insp. Javert)

### v4 ~ "Is it Right for You to be Angry?"

- Jonah is <u>offended</u> and <u>incensed</u> at God's <u>mercy</u> & <u>forgiveness</u>
- He wants to see "*justice*" ~ <u>not mercy</u>, no not mercy
- God asks this question of me a lot ..
  - At times I am easily angered ~ And it's mostly at petty things
  - Anger is funny that way ~ The spark can be so tiny
  - $\circ$  The <u>fuel</u> for the <u>fire of anger</u> is within us  $\sim$  any little thing can ignite it
- Jonah probably has a lot of fuel ("loss, hurt, bitterness")
  - $\circ~$  His reaction may be far less severe than ours would if we were in his situation

### God's Grace not Under Our Control

• The correct answer to God's rhetorical question is "No..." / for Jonah and us

### As Judge over all the Earth God exercises justice and mercy at His discretion

# James 2.13 ~ "Judgment is without mercy to the one who has shown no mercy. Mercy triumphs over judgment."

In the Lord's Table we see mercy triumphing over judgment
